Prahran Community Learning Centre celebrated 40 years in 2019!

Did you know that PCLC students and participants range in age from 6 months to 92 years!

Most people only come to PCLC for one activity, class or service. This means people may not know the diverse range of service delivery that PCLC undertakes.

Did you also know that PCLC originated as a Neighbourhood House in 1979 and although the words "neighbourhood" and "house" may have dropped off our name, we are most certainly still a neighbourhood house first and foremost.

Recent studies have shown that loneliness and feelings of disconnect are increasingly prevalent in society, contributing to a myriad of related problems: from general physical and emotional ill-health, to depression, substance abuse, domestic violence and crime, even suicide.

Neighbourhood Houses such as PCLC, work at the heart of their communities. We offer activities, programs and services that support the objectives of social inclusion and address factors that can lead to social exclusion. In short, we bring people together, help combat loneliness and provide the human connection that is so vital to health and wellbeing.

Loneliness is such a serious social, mental and physical health problem that the UK Conservative Government appointed a Minister for Loneliness. Tracey Crouch was anointed as the first ever Minister for Loneliness following a report from the Jo Cox Commission on Loneliness. It would be most welcome to see this innovative and important initiative here in Australia.

Did you also know that as well as providing valuable neighbourhood house services, PCLC is also a Registered Training Organisation, a Learn Local provider, a non-mainstream secondary school provider, a registered Occasional Child Care service, a Home and Community Care provider, a Commonwealth Home Support Provider and the owner of a social enterprise, The Collective Boutique.

We certainly think PCLC is unique!

2019, our 40th anniversary, was an active year, one with some noteworthy achievements.

In 2019, there were 263 module enrolments in our ACFE funded courses resulting in 20756 student contact hours. There were 45 module enrolments in the CUA20715 Certificate II in Visual Arts course resulting in 1950 student contact hours. There were 74 module enrolments in the CUA31115 Certificate III in Visual Arts course resulting in 3455 student contact hours.

In 2019, PCLC was successful in gaining the Rainbow Tick accreditation. Rainbow Tick is awarded to services that achieve the very highest standard of LGBTIQ inclusive practice. It is a certification mark for organisations that complete a Diversity & Inclusion assessment process. PCLC is proud of our Rainbow Tick accreditation and continue to demonstrate our commitment to LGBTI pride, diversity and inclusion.

The PCLC Committee of Management has been a wonderful resource and key driver of the work of PCLC. Their expertise and commitment to continuous improvement has been instrumental in enabling PCLC to continue to implement the strategic priorities with a view to fulfilling the objectives by 2022. PCLC would like to thank the volunteers for their commitment during 2019 and in particular, to our Committee of Management, who are also volunteers.

We are also grateful to our State and Federal funding bodies for their continued support of our programs and services:

To deliver our programs and meet our service agreement targets during 2019, PCLC employed 2 fulltime staff, 11 part time staff, 12 casual staff and 7 contractors totalling 32 people.

In addition to our Committee of Management, we also welcomed a total of 12 volunteers who assisted in various roles in 2019.

In 2019, a huge total of 790 people used the Centre in some capacity. PCLC was also represented on 10 external groups such as the Youth Education Partnership, the Inner Eastern Local Learning Employment Network, the Community House Network and the Communities That Care (Stonnington).

To everyone involved in PCLC during our anniversary year, to those who attends classes or programs, who teaches or volunteers, or who support the organisation in some way, a sincere thank you.

THE SIX STANDARDS OF RAINBOW TICK **ACCREDITATION**

ORGANISATIONAL CAPABILITY

An organisation must be able to demonstrate that it has embedded LGBTIQ inclusive practices across all of its systems and continuously seeks out opportunities for improvements.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

All staff and volunteers understand their responsibilities to LGBTIQ consumers and are trained and able to deliver LGBTIO inclusive services.

CONSUMER PARTICIPATION

LGBTIQ consumers are consulted and participate in the planning, development, and review of the organisation's services.

A WELCOMING AND ACCESSIBLE ORGANISATION

LGBTIQ consumers can easily and confidently access services as the physical and virtual environments including information, structures, resources and processes, are welcoming.

DISCLOSURE AND DOCUMENTATION

LGBTIQ consumers, staff and volunteers feel safe providing personal information, including their sexual orientation, gender identity and/ or intersex status, because they know information will be treated respectfully and that there are systems in place to ensure their privacy.

CULTURALLY SAFE AND ACCEPTABLE SERVICES

Services and programs identify, assess, and manage risks to ensure the cultural safety of LGBTIQ consumers.
